The relevance of comics in the field of medical science has received great momentum with the publication of Graphic Medicine Manifesto in May 2015 by the creative collaboration of MK Czerwiek, Ian Williams, Susan Merrill Squier, Michael J. Green, Kimberly R. Myers, and Scott T. Smith. In the website of Graphic Medicine, it is stated that:

As a manifesto the project resists the idea that there is one universal subject, experience, or point of view; instead, it points to the need for offering a more inclusive perspective of medicine, illness, disability, caregiving, and being cared for. Essays in this volume consider how research in graphic medicine has begun to challenge the boundaries of conventional academic disciplines and how graphic medicine narratives have the potential to engage healthcare workers, patients, and educators in life-changing ways. The volume draws the conclusion that creating graphic narratives in various health contexts is an important social practice, and that, to this end, comics are a valuable rhetorical medium.

Unlike the verbal and other visual narratives like photographs or movies, a graphic narrative reader can appropriate the speed of his narrative reading. Or in other words, s/he can control the narrative according to her/his interpretive or comprehending capacity. Though a picture can communicate an idea or emotion more rapidly than a verbal narrative, the time a comics writer takes for its illustration or drawing is very huge compared to a verbal narrative. The time and effort a graphic narrator takes to compile her work is very long.

Another factor that takes the attention of the wider public to these comics is its cathartic function. During the pandemic many comics have appeared both in the web and in printed form. They are collected and published in the web platform graphicmedicine.org. Though it is not an exclusive or exhaustive list, they have attempted to collect and archive comics related to Covid-19 pandemic and lot of other comics related to graphic medicine. On analysing these comics, we can see that some of them function as autobiographical in nature, some are therapeutic or cathartic in its temperament. Majority of these comics deals with the issues of people's resistance, resilience and their coping with this pandemic situation. When some comics uses humour element to explain and explicate this gruesome situation, some are serious and perform as educational comics. There are covid comics that are crafted for children and instructing them what should they do in such a situation.

One of the key strengths of graphic narratives lies in their ability to humanize the experiences associated with the pandemic. By depicting personal stories, struggles, and triumphs, comics provide a platform for individuals to connect with and empathize with the lived realities of others. While traditional modes of narratives may convey information and stories effectively, graphic narratives offer a unique
