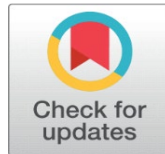
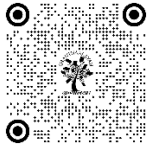


INTEGRATION OF STORYTELLING AND ECOLOGICAL AWARENESS IN RUSKIN BOND'S SHORT STORIES
